VNSNY, Lutheran Team Up To Expand Services

The VNSNY TimeBank is a way for people to use their skills, share their passions, meet their neighbors, and lend a helping hand. Membership in the TimeBank is free and open to people of all backgrounds, ages and levels of ability. Members earn one "Time Credit" for every hour they contribute helping another member; they can then redeem their credits to receive services themselves.

Dozens of services — including assistance with shopping, companionship, computer lessons, minor home repair, tutoring, cooking and more — are given and received by members. Since 2009, Lutheran has been a key partner in the TimeBank's successful expansion to Sunset Park. With the creation of this new satellite partnership, Lutheran's AmeriCorps staff will now be trained to enroll, screen, match and organize TimeBank members.

"Everybody is feeling the pinch of budget cuts these days," said Kathleen Hopkins, vice president of community services for Lutheran
